Message from the Principal

A Happy New Year, both calendar and lunar! 2013 sees the business and IT programmes of ICL Business School in our new premises in the Dilworth Building (see photo below). We have made progress on our application for approval of the Graduate Diploma in International Business Innovation, and the NZQA panel is meeting on 27th to 28th March to assess our application. We are very grateful to our GradDip Advisory board members Prof Michèle Akoorie and Garry Reynolds for their guidance in our revisions to the programme. The original submission was in April 2011 and the last revision was in April 2012. Most of the changes we have made at this stage are in updating texts, as these days key texts pass out of fashion increasingly quickly.

We are delighted to announce the appointment of Jonathan Wright as Librarian for ICL Business School. Jonathan is an IELTS tutor at AEA, but has a Masters degree in Library and Information Studies from Victoria University Wellington. He will be extending our library, acquiring a bank of online resources and providing students with assistance in sourcing materials and general guidance in research, even at undergraduate diploma level.

Recent and Future Research Projects

Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Tuning with the hermit crab: Supporting Maori and Pasifika learners towards achievements

The upcoming research project from ICL's Early Childhood Education department is to investigate issues related to student achievement. investigation will be based on how the ICL took innovative strategies to support learners to succeed. The background includes an environmental switch in the organization from a majority of international students to a predominance of Maori and Pasifika learners. A total of 25 learners, who graduated in 2012 from the School, will be the population of the study. Focussed Group Discussion (FGD) interviews will be used as research tools. The academic and administrative staff will also be interviewed to gain in-depth ideas on management and leadership challenges. A metaphoric model of the hermit crab (Thompson, 2012) will be used to analyze the data. The research is aimed to have a time frame of February 2013 to December 2013.

Research timeline:

February 2013: Development of proposal and application for an Ako Aotearoa research grant March 2013-April 2013: Ethics application approval May 2013: Literature review June-July 2013: Data collection August-September 2013: Data Analysis October 2013: Finding and conclusion November-December 2013: Presentation and publication.



Auckland English Academy (AEA)

As part of its professional development activities, AEA has initiated a program of reflective practice through action research.

Dr Martin East, Dean of Research in the School of Education at The University of Auckland, was invited to deliver a workshop titled "Undertaking action research in the classroom: what is it and where do I start?" Drawing on articles by McNiff (2011) and Ferrance (2001), he compared action research with empirical research ("In action research, researchers do research on themselves. Empirical researchers enquire into other people's lives." (McNiff, 2011) and drew parallels with the New Zealand Curriculum concept of "Teaching as Inquiry". Martin then presented an overview of a process that could be followed before devoting the remainder of the workshop to guiding participants towards developing research questions. The expected benefits to AEA are continuous improvement in teaching and learning. In the words of McNiff, by engaging in the action research process, teachers will be able to "achieve a better understanding of [themselves], so that [they] can continue developing [themselves] and [their] work."

E-Waste: Do consumers care? A social cognitive approach

Objective of the project: The aim of the proposed research project is to find the prevalent variables that influence ethical/moral awareness towards e-waste in New Zealand. The participants of the research project are consumers of electronic goods. The research will be a deductive study set within the various conceptual frameworks of individual ethical/moral development theories.

Progress: The literature review and theoretical framework development has been completed. The project is scheduled to be concluded in time for presentation at the WasteMINZ 25th Annual Conference in Rotorua in October 2013. The findings of this study may be of interest to academics, researchers, development practitioners and policy makers.
