Earlier this month we acquired Bridge International College in Auckland, the latest member of ICL Education Group. Men studying ECE: Perceptions and reality from inside and outside the box

Our study looked at whether approval for men to undertake early childhood teacher education study is common. The data source included two groups of people to see how they perceive males studying ECE. The first group is related to the ECE sector, and comprises **ECE** teacher educators, teachers, students and parents. The second group of people comprises other professionals, not linked to ECE. Both groups were questioned to achieve four research goals: 1) to learn how the ECE relevant group perceive males studying ECE, 2) to learn how the ECE non-relevant group perceive them, 3) to analyse any difference in their perceptions, and 4) to collate proposals from both groups on how to increase male participation in ECE. Under a qualitative research paradigm, 36 participants completed a six-item open-ended questionnaire; 18

ECE-relevant and 18 ECE non-relevant. Purposive random sampling was used to include people from different genders and ages. Some of the participants are from Private а Training Establishment (PTE) and others are from three early childhood services in Auckland. The collected data was analysed by two-level coding. The findings point to the ECE-relevant group being more supportive of men studying ECE; however, wider ideas on how to increase the low male participation were suggested by the non-ECE group. The finding will be useful to the ECE sector for developing and implementing strategies to increase male participation.

Purposeful teaching for today's child: (Re)Framing your role as an early childhood teacher

This day-long workshop offered discussion on current issues of early childhood, looking at the teaching from a more modern perspective. The presenters are from EC Professional Support, The University of Auckland. They were Dr. Helen Hedges, Maria Cooper, Bridget Williams, Barbara Watson, Kiri Eames, and Shareen Sapsworth. The presentations discussed how in the context of early childhood education (ECE) there is a shift from an activity-based approach to an interest-based approach. The processes of noticing, recognizing and responding were discussed thoroughly with a mention of how recognizing is a tricky part of the

process. There can be significant differences between what you see while observing a child and what the child's interest is. A child riding bike all day may lead to an assumption of the child's interest to be the bike or riding, but a deeper level of thinking may lead to recognize the child's interest to interact with other children while riding the bike. With the shift from surface level thinking to deeper level thinking in teaching, the concepts around professional development also need to be shifted.
