



Abstract

□ Music Acoustics evidences logarithmic spiral models in the inner texture of the pitched sound (Novac, Charalambides, 2003), and so does neuroscience in the understanding various mechanisms involved in the human perception of the pitched sound - adding other spirals to the previous model (Bekeszy, 1960; Patterson, 1994; Gupta, 1995; Krumhansl, 19980. Abraham (2012) affirms that the logarithmic spiral holds the potential to justify the connectedness between sound systems in order to manifest as music. In this paper Abraham matches her previous findings to Ken Wilber Spiral Dynamics' philosophy, integrating geometric models revealed in both music the theory - i.e., Pythagoras, Boetius, Zarlino (Apel, 1969), Ghyka (1952), Nolan (2002), Tymoczo (2006), and spiritual findings (Melchizedek, 2000). While neither physics or astrophysics cannot demonstrate the model of interconnectedness in the universe, music - via the logarithmic spiral models and can justify why the strings of the un-plucked guitar vibrate while another guitar is played, and so all other elastic bodies in the universe following a predictability pattern based on the Cartesian (logarithmic spiral) model.

Chairman's report on stakeholder engagement

Since I became Chairman of ICL Education Group I have been engaged with government agencies on several issues. The definition of full-time education as 20 hours per week is discriminatory against the private sector, given that in the state sector the definition is three papers. Amending the definition requires legislation, and as the "diary" is full for the year ending June, it won't happen until late 2015 or 2016. There is a further definition that an academic year is now proposed by INZ to be 30 weeks, as opposed to eight months, a much vaguer definition!

I have been working with Education NZ and the Roadmap: the plan to develop cross-sectoral international marketing. After a year of consultation we have formed elements of an action plan to carry out Roadmap strategies.

I have been on the NZQA credit recognition and transfer (CRT) committee: Degree level since its inception in November. It meets monthly to analyze the barriers to CRT: primarily lack of trust, inconsistency across sectors, lack of/visibility of information for students, insufficient internal policies or resources, variation in programme design, institutional distinctiveness, TEC funding implications and cost. We're approaching the completion of our CRT recommendations and will then move on to RPL.

I have also attended the NZQA Advisory Group on international qualifications frameworks: I was invited along to a presentation in February by European Framework development leaders. The NZQF is seen as a world leader and the EQF looks favourably at us in their search for a framework. In particular the Irish started "borrowing" from NZ's and other frameworks in 1999.

I attended the February NZQA Peak Body Forum on behalf of English NZ, in particular to represent their concerns on the MoE data collection project, which is likely to impose high costs and unnecessary additional compliance.

Finally, since December I have been actively engaged on behalf of ITENZ as well as ICL on "the Indian visa problem".
