# A Private Boat – Security and Vulnerability in Where the Wild Things Are

**Speaker:** Ewen Mackenzie-Bowie, Principal, ICL Business School, Auckland

#### **Abstract**

Max, the hero of *Where the Wild Things Are* is around the age of five, by which time, according to Adler, he has defined his ultimate goal, security. Freud identifies this as the time when his superego is on the point of development. Max's journey to where the wild things are and back is a triumph of the pleasure principle over the reality principle, but it culminates in a reversal of fortune at the end, when the id is suppressed by the ego, shown by his wolf suit beginning to come off. Max's domination of the wild things is akin to dragon slaying, in his heroic journey towards gaining his mother's affection, thereby defeating his Oedipus complex.

As the story progresses Max's security and vulnerability alternate, in episodes which are well crafted by Sendak's use of positioning and framing, and counterpoint between word and picture. His outward journey's dependence on "a private boat" indicates his vulnerability, and the fact that the ocean actually "tumbles by" him rather than the more normal converse indicates an emerging inferiority, returning to Adler. Finally we briefly analyse the book cover, which presents a picture of security. It's getting into the boat that makes you vulnerable, and that's what adventure is all about!

# Rationalising Males in Early Childhood Teaching: Views of People & Views of Policy

**Speaker:** Tahera Afrin, Lecturer, Early Childhood Education, ICL Business School, Auckland

Despite Government efforts in the past few years, male participation in Early Childhood Education (ECE) continues to remain low. The project will be taken as an effort to identify public judgment on this and to explore whether there is a significant difference between 'public' opinion and the existing policies related to the ECE employment. Public is considered to be people related to ECE and people who are not (Non-ECE).

A mixed research paradigm will be used in this project with three research tools: questionnaire, interviews and document analysis. Questionnaire and interviews will be used for primary data and document analysis will be used for secondary data.

Primary data will be collected from 36 participants who will be purposively selected. They will be the teaching staff or students from different departments of a Private Training Establishment (PTE) that has a department teaching courses on Early Childhood Education (ECE) and departments that offer courses on other subjects, Non-ECE. Groups will be selected from the industry representatives related to the ECE department. Four participants from each of the following nine categories will be interviewed followed by completion of close-ended questionnaires:

- · ECE male students
- · ECE female students
- ECE lecturers
- Non-ECE male students
- · Non-ECE female students
- Non-ECE lecturers
- · ECE centre supervisors
- Male parents for the centre
- Female parents from the centre

Questionnaires and interviews will be analysed by MS Excel / SPSS and manual coding. Secondary data will be collected from the relevant literature available on the websites of relevant organisations such as the Ministry of Education, Child Forum, Early Childhood Council (ECC), New Zealand Educational Institute (NZEI) and participating centres' policies. The literature will be analysed using the content analysis method.

The findings will be helpful to gain useful insights to improve male participation in the Early Childhood Education (ECE) sector.

# **Collaborative Innovation**

Speaker: Dana Niko, Lecturer, ICL Business School, Auckland

#### Abstract

This paper considers a strategy of 'collaborative innovation' for New Zealand firms on an international scale. First, the author will review the evolution of innovation theory leading to 'collaborative innovation' in the contemporary literature. A case study is then presented as an exemplar of successful collaborative innovation between a NZ SME and a large multinational. The case study is novel as it considers the perspectives of both companies and specifically addresses the interaction between firms, rather than one or other's specific strategy, as is predominantly reported. The relationship itself was found to be instrumental in the success of the SME firm. The persistence, long-term attitude, and all managers willingness to learn strengthened the collaborative relationship. The affiliation between managers was part of the reason a senior manager in the larger firm championed the smaller firm and it is this risk-taking which was another key to the SME's achievements. Other themes which emerged as contributors to the collaborative success included the cultural and technological fit of the two firms. Unlike other studies, geographical distance had a negative effect and shaped the strategic approach of the New Zealand managers. The author concludes with future research questions into institutional theory and innovation policy.
